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A LETTER FROM THE **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

BUILDING A WORLD WITHOUT FOOD INSECURITY AND HOMELESSNESS ONE MEAL, ONE BED AT A TIME

Dear Friends.

I am writing this message to you from a quiet conference room at the new Vineyard Resource Center in Livermore, a facility that combines 23 permanent-supportive apartments under the same roof as laundry services, showers, mailboxes, office space, case management, the Open Heart Refuge overnight shelter, and Open



Heart Kitchen's first-ever permanent kitchen. While the room I'm writing from is quiet, there is nothing quiet about the steady flow of traffic from folks just outside my door who visit Vineyard to access the services they and their children need to thrive. I always knew Vineyard would be special, but even I have been amazed at just how important a beacon of hope it has already become for the community.

Every annual report is a mix of looking back and looking ahead. Although I have only been the Executive Director at Open Heart Kitchen for a little over a year, I have already come to expect that our organization is always preoccupied with two questions: 1) How do we strengthen the work we're already doing in the Tri-Valley?; and 2) What's next? There is not a day that goes by where I am not asking these questions and challenging my staff to do the same.

Open Heart Kitchen was built upon a foundation of love and care for those in our community suffering under the weight of food insecurity. As an organization we have gone through all the growing pains you'd expect from a non-profit started by volunteers that has now grown to a staff of 23 to meet the growing need in our community for basic human rights like food, clothing, and shelter. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and the leadership of those who came before me, Open Heart Kitchen is growing and thriving. The launch of the Vineyard Resource Center has been a dream in the making for seven years and it's finally here. With that dream came a professional kitchen capable of producing high-quality meals for decades to come and the birth of Open Heart Refuge, an overnight 20-bed shelter for the unhoused of our community and folks in crisis. And in a few months of the writing of this letter, we will once again welcome home a dream - the birth of the first-ever large scale food redistribution effort in east Alameda County - the Open Heart Food Bank - a 19,000 sq. ft. facility capable of redistributing millions of pounds of food.

We now stand on the eve of our 30th anniversary in 2025. I remember being a kid watching science fiction movies with life pitched way into the future - perhaps all the way in 2025 - imagining how different life would be. As I look back I wonder if I ever dreamed, as the Nobel Peace Prize winner, Muhammed Yunus dreamed, of a museum of poverty; a building where the children of the future would go and marvel at the phenomenon of poverty, where the children would ask questions that couldn't be answered, like - "There was great wealth and prosperity and everyone was splurging, so why were others poor and dying?"

This question keeps me awake at night. I am tempted to believe that the only answer available requires me to close my eyes but I prefer dreaming with my eyes wide open. Our staff and

volunteers, too, dream with their eyes wide open every time they serve a free nutritious meal at Vineyard or at one of our senior meal sites or at one of our pop-up pantry locations. They dream with eyes wide open when they take the time to really see an unhoused individual not as a community liability but as a person who feels and thinks and also dreams for their future.

Dreaming doesn't require us to close our eyes but it does demand that we never give up on doing the seemingly impossible - to imagine a future where everyone is fed, clothed, housed, healthy, and a valued community member.

Impossible? Maybe, but then again, Open Heart Kitchen prides itself on doing the impossible. Our community demands nothing less from us, and with the continued love and support from our volunteers and donors more people will thrive and live in a world where parents aren't forced to ration their food so their kids can eat or be confined to an existence of chronic homelessness and social invisibility.

Together, we can and will amplify client voices, and one day achieve our vision where we meet the most basic human needs of vulnerable people in our community by empowering them to build better futures. And perhaps the day will come when our children will visit the museum of poverty and no longer need to ask - "Why were people poor and dying in a time of such great wealth and prosperity?"

Cour Programs

Open Heart is for all. Our Community Meal Program offers hot meals to anyone in need, free of charge, on weekdays from 12PM-5PM at the Vineyard Resource Center in Livermore. Busy families can take meals togo for later, or pick up meals to share.

Open Heart is for older adults. Our Senior Meal Program is for those over the age of 60, serving fresh meals tailored to our diners' dietary needs and preferences. Lunch is served on weekdays at the Dublin Senior Center, the Robert Livermore Community Center, and the Pleasanton Senior Center. These free meals are served communally, to promote vital socialization.

Open Heart is for groceries. Our Pop-Up Pantry Program distributes grocery boxes from the Alameda County Community Food Bank comprised of produce, proteins, dairy products, and pantry items. We also help with the CalFresh (food stamps) application process. Later this year we will be opening the Open Heart Food Bank, go to page 5 to read more!

Open Heart is for our neighbors facing homelessness. Our Street Outreach Program delivers food to encampments, providing a lifeline of care to our most isolated and vulnerable unhoused clients. The newly opened Open Heart Refuge adult shelter provides safe rest and hot breakfast to 20 guests each night. Our unhoused community members can access free meals, shelter, showers, laundry, case management, housing navigation, and more at the Vineyard Resource Center.







THE TRI-VALLEY NEEDS HOMELESS SERVICES -THE VINEYARD RESOURCE CENTER IS THE SOLUTION

Since opening on January 22, 2024, the Vineyard Resource Center has been a safe and welcoming space for all community members in need of free, supportive services and resources. Home to our main production kitchen, our weekday Community Meal Program, and our nightly Open Heart Refuge shelter, this center also offers clients access to free showers, laundry, case management, housing navigation, and more.

The Vineyard Resource Center is the only facility of it's kind in our area with the capability of providing this level of wrap-around, humanizing services. Recently, a woman made it to the Center wearing nothing more than her undergarments with mud caked in her hair. She needed community support and to have her basic human needs met. Our Program Coordinator greeted her, learned her name, and helped her to a hot shower. She was given a fresh change of clothes from our clothing closet, her items were laundered, and she sat

down to a hot meal. We were left to wonder, what might have happened to her if she were facing this crisis just weeks prior, before the center had opened? Now that she has found the Vineyard Resource Center she visits us regularly to access meals, showers, and clothing. Vineyard is a stable place where she is able to be herself. If you know of someone in crisis, call 9-1-1, or the national suicide and crisis lifeline at 9-8-8. **Contact Open Heart Kitchen to discuss options** for non-emergency, local services.

In order to make ends meet in our area a 4-person household needs an annual income of \$123,615. However, 14.3% of those families make less than \$50,000, according to the Tri-Valley Non-Profit Alliance report, "Just Getting By in the Tri-Valley."

TEAMWORK MAKES THE DREAM WORK!

The life-saving and life-enhancing work that's already being accomplished at the Vineyard Resource Center is only possible thanks to a strong, connected web of dedicated community partners.



The Housing Consortium of the East Bay has been the driving force behind the Vineyard Resource Center project since day one, working with Open Heart Kitchen, the Tri-Valley Cities, and other service providers.

They manage the 23 permanent-supportive apartments, as well as other service coordination within the center. They were recently featured in a segment of TV30. Scan the QR Code to watch!

Weekly outreach is conducted at the Center by local nonprofit providers. Our friends from Axis Community Health, Bay Area Community Health, CityServe, Partners for Change, and Tri-Valley Haven impress and inspire us with their compassionate care as they meet with clients to help them explore resources and gain stability. The Center offers comfortable meeting spaces, including private offices, a lounge-style community room, or the dining room!




